A Message from Our Chair

The first draft of this year's annual report was written in anticipation of publication during Lent. It seemed the perfect time to be still and reflect on the year behind us while looking forward to the year ahead. Now, it appears we are in a time where reflections need to keep pace with the many adaptations required to thrive during a rapidly changing world. Trinity Council chose to delay publication of this report and our annual congregational meeting until we knew more about how COVID-19 would impact our ability to meet in person. Now, we are starting to see a need to hold that meeting online. Detailed information will be distributed to all members and adherents as soon as we can be sure to follow Regional United Church guidelines regarding such matters. In preparation of said congregational meeting, here is the long awaited recap of Council's activities:

As many of you know, the spiritual path of our church family this year led us through a shift in the governing structure so that we could better organize and serve our community. We're still building up that structure and ironing out the transition in leadership but, I'm proud to say we managed to run business as usual because of how diligently every leader in our church family picked up and/or continued the day to day work. There are too many people for me to thank here but, all of our Council members know how vital you've been and continue to be. It's clear we have many strengths as a community so, now we're just looking to streamline policy in such a way that will facilitate teamwork and growth. Council has called in Regional help with protocol development in everything from M&P processes to rental contracts.

To continue our spiritual work, Council recognizes how vital our financial and community health is. One of our goals is to increase revenue generation and outreach through renting our spaces to non-profit organizations without sacrificing the peace of mind that comes with restricting building access to members/long time affiliates only. To achieve this, we had a programmable lock installed on the 7th avenue door. Now, the building can be accessed as needed during our operating hours while lost or stolen keys can be deactivated. As you know, Council has oversight of all that happens in the church and many of our meetings addressed

specific needs of one ministry or another. I won't go into everything we've done here however, all Council minutes are publicly available on Trinity's website and I'm always happy to discuss business if you're curious about something specific.

Council's ideal practice moving forward will be to have a sustainable way for everyone to provide suggestions and feedback. After all, a leader's responsibility is to the people they lead so, we want to know what you think! There is no one right spiritual path but, one thing is clear: We are to love and care for others as fiercely as we love ourselves. We are to stand alongside those that are forced into hardships that no one should handle alone. Now more than ever, I see daily examples of how our community of faith strengthens and improves the lives of individuals. I've seen people that hardly know each other jump in to help each other without a second thought. Solutions to obstacles are being freely offered and arranged. These are the teachings of the community I serve and, I am honoured to continue serving in whatever capacity is deemed useful. To lead well is to lead together.

Finance Report

Buildings & Grounds

The purpose of this Ministry is to maintain the building infrastructure and systems and its surrounding grounds.

This was a particularly challenging year following an inspection of our premises by the Montreal Fire Department. We were obliged to install a fire alarm system to monitor the Sanctuary, Memorial Hall, the gym and kitchen, and the caretaker's apartment. This project was awarded to Guard-X and consisted of a control panel, heat and smoke detectors, and evacuation alarms throughout the buildings. Integral to this work was the replacement of the mechanical door lock for the 7th Avenue entrance with an electronic lock and monitoring system. We also had to repair the fire escape leading from Memorial Hall down to the lane and install a fire door in the kitchen. All exit doors were fitted with hydraulic closing devices.



Other projects included re-taping the Aframe plexiglass panels over the main entrance, purchasing and installing a mini Tempo shelter for the 8th Avenue emergency exit, purchasing a new gaspowered lawnmower, and replacing the leaking hot water heater. A special group gathered to assemble scaffolding and change most of the 500-watt bulbs in the Sanctuary. Various improvements were made to roof drains and bathroom plumbing throughout both buildings. A guard plate was added to the front door lock to provide added security against forced entry.

In an effort to reduce electricity consumption, the window frames in Memorial Hall and the 8th Avenue side of the Sanctuary were re-caulked to reduce heat loss. The Buildings and Grounds Ministry is thankful to count on the dedicated presence of Ashley Verhaeghe for his expertise and guidance in regular maintenance work and as contact person for the church during special projects requiring outside tradespeople. I would also like to extend thanks to John Brosseau, Gordon Bailey, John Bridgman, David and Gary Garland, Eric Garceau and Patrice Laporte for the invaluable assistance they provide in their continuous service to this Ministry at Trinity.

Fund Development



Our group is tasked with finding ways to fundraise to support the church. We do this through fundraising events and managing rentals of the church and its facilities.

Our group has held a number of meetings this year to discuss how we can best run fundraisers and make an effort to coordinate with other church groups such as Fellowship and M & S. This way we hope that people can participate in as many events as they want to.

We have also taken a look at our costs to put on events, and, have made efforts to keep all the events affordable for families and seniors in particular.

In coordination with Fellowship, we held a survey in September to see which events our congregation wanted to have. The top two Fundraising events that were voted for were a Pizza and Games night and Italian Night.

Pizza and Games night was held on Feb 1st and was a success raising \$170. We will hold the Italian Night in March and hope that we can raise even more.

In November, we rented the church Narthex to Elections Canada and we have had several

other smaller rentals. We are looking into what our costs are and how much we need to charge to ensure that we cover our insurance, heating and electricity costs and still make an amount for the church. This project is ongoing and we hope to have a price list to submit to Council later this year.

We have also looked at on-line fundraising opportunities. Some money was raised on the Canada Helps website but we still need to work more with the Communications team to broaden our outreach on this platform in order to raise more next year, and particularly on Giving Tuesday (day after Cyber Monday).

We are also looking at opportunities to ask companies to sponsor some of our events. This year the Maple Treat Company donated the maple syrup for two Fellowship events and for the Pancake Supper held this February to raise money to send kids to camp.
