Minister's Message

Dear Friends,

Advent is here and just in time! For aren't we all in need of a time to slow down and take stock? We have been like a people "walking in darkness" over the duration of this pandemic. We have consistently tried to keep looking for the light that will bring us through this time - looking to Jesus as our light, our compass, our Way. This season of preparation for Christmas once again gives us the chance to rekindle our hope, peace, joy and love for ourselves, our communities and this world.

The hope of the child to be born can be our hope once again. God will provide a new generation to take up the challenges the world is currently now facing. God will provide a new generation who will take up the faith that keeps us going! Be it meta-issues such as the climate crisis, reconciliation with and justice for indigenous people, for feeding the hungry -God shows us that life, that love, is meant to be lived incarnationally. Our bodies, our relationships with others, our caring for our planet home, all are part of the hope we can set before the Christ child, a gift to him and a gift for us and future generations.

The peace of the child to come is yours as you reach deep down into yourselves, knowing your inner goodness, knowing you are loved by your Creator and by me and by your church. We can achieve greater peace as we reach out to each other and get to know each other. Christ's peace comes as we ask for help and trust God will provide what we need.

Joy can return in this season! If we've been too busy, too overloaded with work, not enjoying what we do or how we do it, needing more time for family, friends, the Child waits for you to let go, or ask for help, or reorganize how you do what you do so it can take on new life, bring new joy. Especially in what we bring to the church, God wants our efforts to be meaningful and valued! The child invites us to become community, to belong to and care for one another. Our lives can become centred in gratitude for the joy we give and receive like gifts to the world.

Love. This one word says it all, eh? In Advent we await the rebirth of love at Christmas. It is a love that takes us outside of ourselves, our needs, our wants – to focus on the Child, and all who need a little love in their lives. That could be you – it could be me! It could be a friend in need, or an animal companion that embodies love for us. God loves us unreservedly in giving to us this Child!

Bible Basics: What is Advent?

Advent (from the Latin *adventus*, "coming") marks a period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. We prepare our homes, our hearts, and our minds to receive the gift of Jesus.


During Advent – which starts four Sundays before Christmas – we light candles on an Advent wreath: one for each Sunday and one for Christmas. Traditionally, each of the four Sundays has a theme: love, hope, peace, and joy. The candle in the middle of the wreath is the Christ Candle and is lit on Christmas Eve.

This Advent season our church will be using "God with Us – An Illustrated Advent" as a basis for worship. We will experiment over the four Sundays by including an all-ages interactive discussion of 10-15 minutes while our youth and children are still in the sanctuary with the rest of the

congregation. We anticipate a time for a craft activity adults would enjoy too!

Breakfast with Santa Saturday, Dec. 4 at 11:00 AM





The Tech team has begun installing a temporary production area (behind the brick wall), and putting the equipment into service as it arrives. The configuration of new equipment sometimes has hiccups and the Tech team appreciates the patience of the congregation.


In the meantime, the team has been searching out and consulting with contractors in order to have a permanent tech booth installed at the back of the sanctuary.
