Dear Friends:

2023 started off with a bang for me when on January 1, 2023 I was back in the pulpit after a three month sabbatical (and a month off of holiday as well)! It was time to "hit the ground running" and to reconnect with so many of you after an extended time away. Of course, you all had come through that time with flying colours, keeping worship lively and continuing to be faithful to God's call as a congregation and as individuals. Thank you

again for your faithfulness!

The early months of the year were focussed on governance as Council met and planning got underway for our Annual Meeting. Or should I say, meetings! It turned out that several meetings were needed to accomplish the busy agenda before us. Chair Rosemary Warren organized and guided us through in her careful, inclusive way. We learned (sometimes the hard way!) that our Trinity Handbook was in need of revisions to better align with the will of the congregation. We experienced procedural

hiccups (or was it indigestion?) in how we actually meet and vote and take decisions, and responded with a Special Meeting to Amend the Handbook as a result, taking targeted aim at several articles. Two of note, were to expand the Council to 8 people (an "At Large" position was created!), as well as "regularize" all our Trustees, including specifically those serving faithfully as life-appointed trustees continuing from the old structure to the new one voted in by the congregation back in 2021. We elected a full roster of leaders - Council and Ministry

Teams - and attempted to elect trustees. For trustees, we learned that for both elections and resignations, proper notice needed to be given before this could take place (thus anticipating a need for another meeting for that purpose sometime in the

the heat of our hopes to move forward, we can stumble into voices getting loud as questions of procedure and protocol were raised. Missteps can happen - leaving people frustrated and angry - even though we're all friends in Christ and wanting to work towards the same ends. I know what I learned - yet again! - was the need to speak up as your minister when the pressure seemed on (my colleague the Rev. Stéphane Vermette did speak up in wise ways - thanks Stéphane!).

Like the disciples in a storm-tossed boat, we needed to "wake up Jesus" to help calm our fears and frustrations. To the extent I failed to be that "still, small" voice, I do apologize, and hope to do better (with all your help) in future.

I may have failed in that moment, but Jesus never fails! He's always there, ready to wake up, or wake us up, to calm the storms we face as individuals and as the church. storm to mention is the deficit of some \$90,000 that our Director of Finance announced for budget 2023. We have reserves as everyone knows, but the congregation's giving does not cover our annual operating budget. always relied on our reserves to "top up" the revenues, so our boat doesn't sink. We passed the budget, faithfully presented as always, knowing that there wasn't much we could cut that would put a real dent in the deficit. It remains a topic that Council, and/or a designated group of committed members and friends, needs to look at with great focus so we can consider how to address this huge leak in our boat.

The rest of 2023 saw the always wonderful ways we as Trinity United Church kept working to help "God in God's love." Another fantastic year for our Vacation Bible School! The Friends, Food and Fun group never missed a beat! Our Sunday School continues to serve young people both new to the community and longtime! Our Halloween Carnival was a smash! We honoured Veterans by our presence at Cemetery Services and Remembrance Sunday. We had our first "Community Meal" in November - a big success! Volunteers contributed hours of time to our Tech Team, Finance Team, Worship Team, Fellowship and Fund Development Teams. Our Membership & Pastoral Care ministry grew with more and more calls to check in with more and more of you, sending cards for special occasions and more. Our choir met, rehearsed, and sang, beautifully. And countless other ways. You all

make what we do and who we are possible - thank you!

We said goodbye in death to some very special members we will continue to miss: John Lewchuk, Vera Studnicki, Irma Brathwaite, Gladys Snelgrove, and Mary Yankowski, to name a few.

2023 was also a year of celebrations - John and Beverley Bridgman's 50th Wedding anniversary and renewal of vows on April 16 was a great day of joy! The weddings of Veronica Heffernan and Mathieu Lizarraga on Sept 3, followed by Sabz Heffernan and Angela Brett on October 6, made the fall a special time for many.

You also gave of my time to the wider work of our church. I continued to serve on the Quebec and East Ontario Candidacy Board (along with Gary Tompkins!), shepherding candidates for ministry along towards their calls. I work with the Living into Right Relations Leadership Circle of Nakonha:Ka Regional Council. I served on two granting committees—the Erskine & American and Mountainside Fund, and the (Indigenous) Justice & Reconciliation Fund of the United Church of Canada.



The Trinity Scout Group continued its mission to give our youth the opportunity to grow through personalized adventures.

The 2023 year saw new volunteers join the group and with their fresh perspectives and mentorship, the Trinity Scout Group was able to attend camps during all seasons.

Our membership has stayed stable with youth staying at least 2-3 years. 2023 gave us the opportunity to focus on education, within our Scouting mission.

We also attended an EMSB 'parent-con' where we had the opportunity to discuss with parents and their children the unique Trinity program revered by Quebec Council.

We were also able to present our Trinity Scouts Higher Education Bursary for the first time, for Trinity Scouts member attending post-secondary education. Two bursaries were presented at our annual Philies Award Ceremony due to missing a year because of Covid restrictions. One was presented to Katherine Hetu, who started with Trinity Scouts back in 2011 when she was six years old and the 2023 recipient was Jonathan Hetu who also started with Trinity Scouts in 2011 when he was five years old.

This sounds kind of simplified and 'cold' but the stuff we can't explain is the pride from my Scouts who built a fire in the snow and were able to cook on it. The sense of accomplishment our Beavers felt as they swam up to Cubs. Our Beavers amazement as their 'playing in dirt' craft actually produced flowers and then they planted flowers in front of the church. There's a very deep sense of pride from all our members- especially our Scouters, to be part of a family that is carrying on a tradition that has been around since 1911! About 5 years ago we re-branded ourselves as "Trinity Scouts Group", but we always refer to ourselves as the 'Trinity Family'.
